Brilliant Biologists



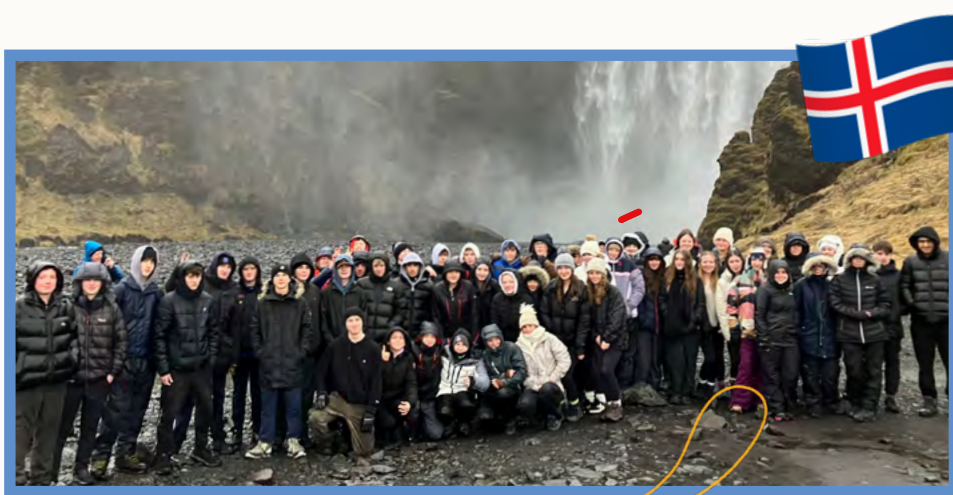

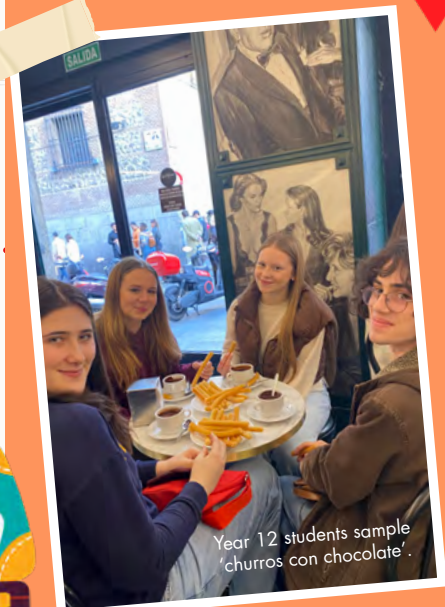
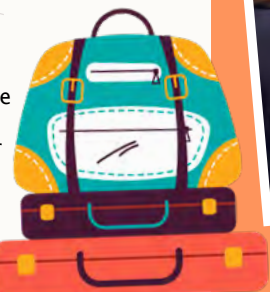
Artistic inspiration in Amsterdam

A trip through history

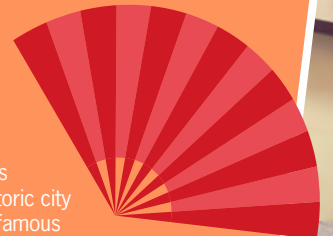

Eve said, "Guided by Wolfgang, our German Language Assistant, highlights included the 1936 Olympic Stadium and poignant landmarks like the Stasi Museum and remains of the Berlin Wall, which provided valuable context for our studies. We also went to the top of the iconic television tower in Alexanderplatz."

IN February, Year 12 and 13 Spanish students headed to Madrid, where they took in the Las Ventas bullring and Rastro flea market among other sights. They also sampled tapas, watched a flamenco show and spent time in our partner school practising their spoken language with their Spanish peers.

In March, 30 Key Stage 4 Spanish students travelled to Cordoba to learn about the culture and history of southern Spain. Highlights included a visit to the historic city of Seville and Cordoba's famous Mosque-Cathedral. Plus, they went to a traditional ceramic-making workshop and an Andalusian equestrian show.
