Knowledge Organiser: Why are relationships important?



Original Sin = the FIRST sin!

Sin = An action which goes against the will of God.

In **Genesis**, Christians learn that God created Adam and Eve in a perfect world. However, they committed the very first sin when they disobeyed God and ate the forbidden fruit. This sin led to a **broken relationship** between God and humans.

Why was Jesus important?

God sent Jesus to fix the broken relationship between God and humans.

Jesus was special because:

- He was the son of God,
- He taught Christians to 'love each other',
- He showed Christians how they should live (help the poor, compassion for the oppressed etc.)

Key Words

Blasphemy = a religious offence, when a person says or does something regarded as being disrespectful to God.

Crucifixion = a method of capital punishment in which the victim is tied or nailed to a large wooden cross or beam and left to hang.

Resurrection = the concept of coming back to life after death.

The 12 Disciples

Jesus had 12 friends, all devout followers, who helped him to **spread the message of God**. Each of them came from different backgrounds and, alongside Jesus, taught people to love and care for others. One of them, Judas, later betrayed Jesus. This led to his trial, sentence and crucifixion.


