This will be the first set of GCSE trial exams which Year 10 students will have undertaken, and it is important that they spend an adequate amount of time revising. The predictions are very promising and suggest that this cohort of students has the potential to do very well in future examinations.

Exam preparation

As we approach the main public exam season, students in the relevant year groups have recently received an

Exams Information booklet with information on what to expect, along with their personalised timetable. If you have not received your child's exam timetable, please contact our Exams Office. Students will receive further information over the next half term as we aim to support all our students through the exam period to ensure they have the best chance of success.

From Monday 15th May (when GCSE exams begin), all **Year 11** students will follow an adapted timetable. This will see students attend subject 'Master Classes' whenever they are not sitting a GCSE exam. These compulsory Master Classes will all have been carefully planned by subject staff to offer students vital information, reminders and key messages in final preparation for the exam they will shortly sit. Therefore, students must attend school every day during normal school hours throughout this period. Revision Leave will begin on Thursday 25th May.

Year 13 students will continue to attend lessons until Friday 19th May, when they will begin their Revision Leave. After Revision Leave begins, students in Years 11 and 13 will only be required to attend school when they have exams, although many subjects will continue to offer extra pre-exam sessions prior to specific exams. Further details will be published before Revision Leave commences.

Finally, Ofqual has published this <u>Student Guide</u> which may be of interest to students sitting public exams this summer and parents/carers.

Tips for helping your child at home

- ◆ Tackling work in smaller, manageable chunks can help to keep students engaged. Suggest completing a certain number of questions or put a time limit on work, factor in a break, and come back refreshed to tackle the next part.
- ◆ Post-it notes are great for visual reminders and breaking information into chunks.
- ♦ Colour coding their timetable can help make it easier to read. Use colours they associate with different subjects. Files and folders can be used in these colours to help with organisation at home.
- ♦ If they struggle with reading lots of text, simply covering parts of the text to reveal only small sections will help them to digest the information and not become overwhelmed.

School uniform requirements from April 2023

Prince Henry's is one of the broad majority of English schools where it is agreed policy that students wear school uniform. Our smart uniform is designed to be practical and affordable. We aim to promote a sense of pride, and teach students that they have a responsibility to themselves and each other to ensure that the good name and reputation of the school are preserved and developed.

A small number of amendments have been made to our uniform requirements in light of feedback from students and to take account of affordability considerations. These will replace the current expectations shown in the Student Planner and will come into effect after Easter. The most significant changes relate to skirts, tights and hair styles, as follows:

Navy-blue blazer with embroidered school crest worn at all times within the school building. Teachers may give permission to remove blazers if the classroom is particularly warm or the learning activity requires it. Navy trousers – these should be boot cut or tailored, must have a waistband, traditional zip and cover the ankles. Slim, skinny fit or tapered trousers are not allowed. Invisible/concealed zips are also
not acceptable.
Navy - Traditional tailored school skirt. Without pleats and must not be a pull-on Lycra skirt. This should be worn no more than 5cm (approximately the width of a mobile phone) above or below the knee.
Plain white tailored style with traditional collar, long sleeved (not to be worn with sleeves rolled up) or short-sleeved. The shirt must be long enough to remain tucked in to trousers or skirt at all times.
Basic school design or Sports tie or Music tie. (There are different ties for Key Stage 3 / Key Stage 4).
Navy or black ankle socks only are permitted.
Plain navy or neutral shade preferred. Black is permitted.
Students must wear plain black shoes that have no logos or white decorative element. Boots are not allowed and footwear must be tailored to fit under the anklebone. Cloth pumps or trainers are not allowed in school. Heels must be no higher than 5 cm.
Optional - Navy blue 'V' neck jumper with embroidered school crest. Students must not wear any other jumper or hoodie under their blazer.
Optional - Black. No decorative buckle.
No outdoor wear such as coats, hats, scarves and gloves may be worn in the building before 3.00pm. Denim, non-uniform jumpers, baseball caps or 'hoodies' must not be worn at any time within the school grounds.
Watch. One earring per lobe – plain gold or silver stud only. No rings, bracelets or necklaces are permitted. Body/facial piercings including nose, eyebrow and tongue piercings (including the use of retainers) are not allowed in years 7-11.
Key Stage 3: No make up or nail varnish may be worn. Key Stage 4: Discreet make up may be worn. No nail varnish may be worn including acrylics.
 Respect must be given to our expectations of high standards of presentation as well as the following: Long hair must be tied back for PE and other practical subjects. Hair colours must be natural - no bold or extreme hair colouring is allowed. Visible lines/patterns/symbols shaved into the head are NOT allowed. The head must NOT be fully shaved below a grade 2 (lower grades are permitted at the side and back) Hair accessories should be one plain colour only.

Collaborative Learning Trust news

Our Trust continues to develop and grow – both in terms of the central services offered to schools and in the number of partners. In recent months, we have appointed a Director of Education (Primary) and an IT Director to join our Central Team, directly supporting schools with quality of education and implementing the best technology for learning and school operations respectively. With the Director of Education focusing on primary school improvement, I have more capacity to support secondary education and to develop our Trust. With that in mind, we are delighted that Ashfield Primary School in Otley and Trinity All Saints Church of England Primary School in Bingley have consulted with staff and parents with the intention of joining our partnership later this year, taking the total number of schools in our Trust to seven.

Our programme of Trust-wide professional development for staff continues; our recent training session, Supporting All Children to Thrive, focused on strategies to help children who suffer with trauma or mental health problems. Key staff from all seven schools attended, so this training will have a positive impact on children and young people in all of our schools.
