UCAS Applications

- Students may choose up to 5 university choices
- They also inform universities of the grades achieved on all completed courses
- This is accompanied with a personal statement outlining their skills, abilities and reasons for choosing this course

TIPS:

- 5 courses, not necessarily 5 institutions
- Aim for a range of entry requirements
- Personal statement needs to cover the bases for *all* of the courses applied for...
- ...without naming courses or institutions

THINGS STUDENTS GET WRONG:

- Not recording everything or not recording it accurately e.g. missing out courses
- Childish or inappropriate email addresses
- Aiming for the final final UCAS deadline...
- Not following the guidance!

Support with applications

- Students have been updating their Unifrog with their competencies and activities all year, as well as researching opportunities
- UCAS support programme starts in earnest after the May half term
- Higher Education and Careers Day, PSHE lessons and form time after May half term dedicated to careers and UCAS support
- Students will be guided through the process of completing applications and writing personal statements by form tutors

School input

- Once a student has completed and submitted their UCAS application this will be checked by the Sixth Form team
- **Pay and submit** means that you pay and submit the form *to us for checking!* So don't panic
- We add a brief reference written by the personal tutor giving school context and any important circumstances universities should know about
- We also add predicted grades
- **We do this for 150 or so students each year. This is why we have earlier deadlines for this than the external UCAS deadline!**

UCAS predicted grades

Not always the same as the MEA grades or predicted grades on the progress report

Predictions based on a combination of performance across the year, Y12 exam results and any NEA units completed

Optimistic but realistic and designed to support students in getting offers

However, little point in being overly optimistic as this may result in university offers which are not realistic for the student.

UCAS has a useful 'historic entry grades' tool so you can see the differences between their published offer and the grades students actually start courses with

Next steps

The Sixth Form team submit applications to the universities and students usually start to receive acknowledgements and offers fairly quickly

Some universities take longer to consider, particularly for competitive courses

Once offers are in, students can make decisions about preferred courses – one Firm choice and one optional Insurance choice

Choice



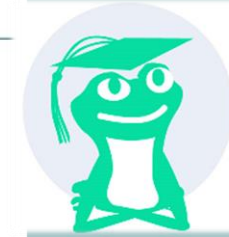
Important messages for students:

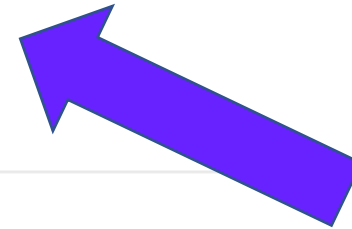

What will your debt be?

- Repayment stops after 40 years if not complete
- Repayment starts at a £25,000 salary
- Interest is charged at RPI

Total amount borrowed:

$£10227 \times 3 = £30681$

$£9250 \times 3 = £27750$

Total = £58431 (plus interest)

Repayment = 9% of income over threshold – more like a tax than a loan

School input

- Students applying for apprenticeships sometimes feel as if all the focus is on university applications
- This is usually because there is a clear application process for university which is communicated at set times in the year and a single point of application
- For apprenticeships, students do have to work harder individually completing different application forms in different formats, and searching in a range of areas
- Degree apprenticeships may be advertised from October onwards for September start date
- Advanced and Higher apprenticeships often not advertised until April or later

Support is available all year round for apprenticeship applications, but students do need to ask for this

There will be an emphasis at particular stages for university applications because there are common times where things need to be done.

Apprenticeship support needs to be more bespoke



School input

- Careers interviews – can point students in the right direction but can't make decisions for them. Will usually leave the student with research to complete
- Time to create CVs/Personal statements which can be tailored for each application
- Practice interviews
- Support with completing application forms
- Work shadowing/apprenticeship preparation sessions (usually Wednesday afternoons)
- Employer talks and meetings with current apprentices
