With GCSE and A Level exams looming the other side of the Easter break, however, spare a thought for our Year 11 and 13 students who are busy finalising timetables for revision over and beyond the holiday. This term has been no exception as we have rolled out electronic recording of 'stamps' and 'incidents' on Arbor. Any change to a system doesn't come without challenges, and we are listening to your feedback and adapting as necessary to ensure that communication is both useful and timely. We are also constantly consulting with staff and students as to their views on the data we are now able to collect and, more importantly, act upon at the touch of a button. For further details please see Mr Clarkson's article (page 4), which pulls out just some of the very pleasing headline figures demonstrating that, on average, 95% of our students receive no Red incidents (those relating to learning) on a daily basis. Students have commented that receiving Yellow incidents does act as a deterrent and we have seen an initial figure of around 17% of our students receiving any incidents reduce to 12% over time.

So, signing off from yet another busy term which has seen alumnus Danny Care officially open our 3G pitch and talk to students in school, an 'old boy' from 1957 who remembers a very different PHGS but still has his name on the Scholarship board and visited the school recently to impart his tales, alongside visitors from near and far - it really does remind us how central to the community we are, both past and present. That's truly what makes Prince Henry's such a special place. As an illustration of perspective, we are fondly looked back on as 'some of the best days of my life' as told by many. Try telling many of our current students that!

With grateful thanks for your part in making our school such a positive, warm and special place. Enjoy Easter and the long-awaited Spring (and Summer), when it finally arrives.

This week, parents/carers will receive the latest Year 11 Progress Report highlighting teachers' GCSE predictions based on current performance. This follows on from last Friday's Predicted Results Ceremony, which provided a useful milestone as students compared their predictions to the entry grades they need for their next steps. The KS4 section of the website now contains a subject by subject guide to what students need to revise for the upcoming GCSEs. This should also be a useful resource for parents/carers.

Exam preparation

As we approach the main public exam season, students in the relevant year groups have recently received an Exams Information booklet with information on what to expect, along with their personalised timetable. If you have not received your child's exam timetable, please contact our Exams Office. Students will receive further information over

the next half term to ensure they have the best chance of success. In addition, Ofqual has published this **Student Guide** for students sitting public exams this summer.

From Tuesday 7th May (when GCSE exams begin), all **Year 11** students will follow an adapted timetable. This will see students attend regular timetabled lessons or subject 'Master Classes' whenever they are not sitting a GCSE exam. These compulsory Master Classes will have been carefully planned by subject staff to offer students vital reminders and key messages in final preparation for the exam they will shortly sit. Therefore, students must attend school every day during normal school hours throughout this time. Year 11 students' final day at school is Thursday 23rd May; their Revision Leave will begin on Friday 24th May.

Year 13 students will continue to attend lessons until Friday 17th May, when they will begin their Revision Leave. After Revision Leave begins, students in **Years 11 and 13** will only be required to attend school when they have exams, although many subjects will continue to offer extra pre-exam sessions prior to specific exams. Further details will be published before Revision Leave commences.

IMPORTANT REMINDERS



- Parents should report any absence to the school via the absence line on **01943 855682 before 8.30am.** Parents should provide the child's full name, form/year and reason for absence.
- 2. Parents should contact the school for **each day** a child will not be attending school.
- 3. If the school are not notified of the absence, parents will be contacted through our **absence text** messaging service **by 9.45am.** This will be followed up with a phone call to request the reason for absence.
- 4. Students must be onsite by 8.25am, all gates are locked at 8.27am. Any student arriving after this will be marked as late.
- 5. Students arriving after 9.00am they will be marked as a U code, which is **unauthorised absence** and this will mean that they can only get 50% attendance for that day.
- 6. We will request medical evidence if a child's absence is 5 or more consecutive days.
- 7. We will request a **specialist letter** when there is an absence of more than **2 weeks**.
- 8. Term time leave will only be granted by the headteacher in **exceptional** circumstances.
- 9. Where possible all appointments should be made outside of the school day.
- We will conduct home visits if your child is absent from school.

Positive Discipline (PD) update

It has been six weeks since we moved to recording all comments (or 'incidents') on Arbor. As expected, this adjustment has taken some time for all parties to get used to. Students have responded really positively to the tiered element of negative comments, which was introduced following feedback gathered last year. We have also received positive feedback from the Student Council on how the changes have impacted students. Recording centrally in Arbor enhances our ability to understand what issues are impacting lessons and how students are performing. For example, the data highlights that on a daily basis over 95% of our students in KS3/4 achieve ZERO Red incidents (given for impacting the learning environment). This is a really positive figure and further emphasises how the huge majority of our students want to learn and achieve, and that they know that the best way to do this is to work respectfully with their teachers.

Following further feedback, we are now making a number of small adjustments to the system from the start of next term. These include:

- ◆ Failure to complete home learning will now be recorded as a Red incident. This gives the class teacher greater control over the management of home learning and helps to support and encourage students in their subject to complete it without causing a disturbance to their own learning.
- ◆ The threshold for an after-school detention will be increased to six Yellow incidents in a half term.

We will monitor how these changes impact student behaviour next term. There may be further tweaks as we look to a full start-of-year launch in September. Please remind your child that, as ever, after Easter they will have a 'clean slate' in terms of negative incidents, so it is up to them to make the most of it!

It is also worth highlighting a few other general points related to PD in Arbor.

- ♦ We appreciate how differently the word 'incident' may be interpreted compared to the older term of 'comment'. This is the term which Arbor uses and we are unable to change this.
- ◆ Parents/carers will be notified whenever a child receives a Red incident and whenever a child receives a sixth Yellow incident (from the start of next term). Please note that following a sixth Yellow incident, the system will escalate the sixth incident and assign a detention to it. This may look like it has been added twice this is not the case and is not an error by the member of staff inputting the incident.
- Understandably, more students accrue a fifth/sixth Yellow incident or third Red incident in one subject towards the end of a term. This means that detentions are always busier immediately following a school holiday. As a result, we have now re-arranged some scheduled detention dates to achieve a better balance in terms of the numbers attending on each day. If you have received notification of a detention, this may mean it is now scheduled on a different day (in the first two weeks of next term) to the date originally notified. The easiest way to confirm when a detention is scheduled to take place is via the Arbor calendar, which shows after-school detentions in orange. Given the two-week Easter holiday, at the start of next term we will send a reminder email to the parents/carers of all students who have a scheduled detention within the first fortnight of the new term.
- ♦ We no longer require parents/carers to sign the Student Planner on a weekly basis. However, students should still bring their planner to school each day for the rest of this academic year.

Thank you for your ongoing support as we seek to ensure that our learning community is one where all students can flourish and achieve in a respectful environment.
