A European adventure

CHOCOLATE, sausages and tigers! Not your average weekend, but after travelling overnight to Cologne, Year 8 students walked along the river Rhine, visited the famous Kölner Zoo and took their seats on some the best rides in the Phantasialand theme park. They were also able to put into practice the German they have been learning in the classroom all year.

Our largest ever group of Year 7 students also took part in this year's Spanish trip to Barcelona, with 79 students visiting Camp Nou football stadium, the Poble Espanyol village and Gaudi's Park Güell and Sagrada Familia cathedral. In addition, they had time to take in the Olympic stadium and the street performers of the Ramblas, spend a day at Port Aventura theme park and sing their hearts out at a karaoke party.

Four days on the French Opal Coast also meant that 72 eager Year 7 students were able to try out their French language skills and soak up the local culture. A packed programme included visits to a sweet factory, a chocolate factory, an aquarium and a traditional French bakery, where students made their own croissants. They also spent the day at a theme park.





STUDENTS from the Year 7 Science Club and Year 8 Gardening Club have been taking part in scientific research alongside British astronaut Tim Peake. The students have been growing rocket seeds under space-age lights, kindly loaned by Stockbridge Technology Centre; half the seeds had been in space for six months while the other half remained on Earth. Their research, into the effects of zero gravity on seed growth, will help future missions into space to grow their own food.

Farah Mackey, Sana Madani and Josh Ibbertson then attended Ashfield Primary School for a radio link-up with Tim. As well as questions about space travel and zero gravity, the students wanted to know how he washed his clothes!

Meanwhile, eight Year 9 Physics students triumphed when they represented Prince Henry's in the first Red Kite Science Olympiad. The competition included a quiz and three different challenges.
